While Florence is best known for its visual arts and architecture, it also has a thriving performing arts scene. This is thanks to its long history as a prosperous city with wealthy clients willing to support musicians and composers, as well as its current history as a center for international studies—several performing arts schools in Florence attract talented students from around the world. From opera to classical music, to stage plays and dance, Florence has a complete programme of performing arts events. A vibrant contemporary scene means that if arias are sung in Italian is not your thing, you can almost always find something a little more modern. With such a thriving arts and culture scene, you'd also expect the city to have some very spectacular places to support a variety of performances. And Allah is All-Knower of what you do. Here are some of Florence's most famous showrooms for getting a show, concert, game, and more. Massimo Borchini / Atlantide Phototravel / Gettyimages Stunning Modern Teatro del Maggio Home to Maggio Musical Fiorentino/Opera di Firenze, a resident of the performing arts company that stages opera, classical music, and dance performances here. Magio Fiorentino is one of Italy's most respected companies, attracting some of Italy's most talented performers and conductors to the stage. The company also offers students academy training in all aspects of theatre performance and production, and an active community development program. The season starts in May and runs until April the following year, and is more or less divided between classical music, ballerina music, opera (including contemporary operas) and ballet. Ticket costs range from 5 to 10 euros for balcony level seats with obstacle views, to 60 euros and for orchestral level, center stage seating. Tickets can be purchased online or at various locations throughout the city; see Magio Fiorentino's website for details. Historic Teatro Niccolini, founded by Lorenzo di Medici in 1658, is Florence's oldest theatre, now fresh from total renovations in 2016. Despite age and care, the surprisingly contemporary season of plays brings to the stage musical performances and modern dance. Titu Nicolini had fallen during a difficult time in the late 20th century, and its grand reopening was greeted warmly by Florinithines. Ticket prices vary depending on performance, but start in the 20-euro range. For more information, visit teatro Niccolini's website. Titu Verdi, which opened in 1854, is the seat of the Della Tuscany Orchestra. In addition to a programme of traditional orchestral performances, the theatre hosts contemporary musical performances with internationally recognized artists such as Staring and Jethro Tol, as well as popular Italian musicians and bands that play jazz, pop and rock. Tickets vary from 20 euros to 100 euros or more depending on the executor. For more information, visit the Teatro Verdi website. Teatro della Pergola Grand Teatro della Pergola dates back to 1661, and it's just a years younger than Teatro Niccolini. Restored to 17th to 19th century grandeur, the theatre is home to teatro della Toscana's performance company, which stages contemporary spin-offs on classic plays such as King Lear and Doll's House as well as new, cutting-edge dramas. Ticket prices start at around 17 euros and go up to €40 for premium seating. For more information, visit the Teatro della Pergola website. Originally built as a hobby hall for blue-collar workers, the fascist-era theatre is currently bringing contemporary works of comedy and social commentary to the stage. Much of it is geared to mature audiences and those who can follow along with Italian humor, but theatre also has a childish schedule, with recent performances by The Wizard of Oz and Little Prince. Tickets are from 15 euros to 40 euros. For more information, visit teatro Puccini's website. Nelson Mandela Forum is an indoor arena for sporting events and rock concerts. Tuscany Hall is an indoor space for rock concerts, food festivals, television broadcasts, and other events. Viserno Arena is an open space with great capacity for rock concerts. Recent big name artists include Ed Sheeran, The Cure, and Imagine Dragons. Stadio Artemio Franchi is the home field of FIORENTINA's ACF football team, and also hosts big-name musical acts such as Madonna, David Bowie, and Bruce Springsteen. Complesso le Murate is a contemporary, experimental art and performance space in a yeast and former prison. Sala Vanni is an intimate hall inside the Church of the Santa Maria del Carmine complex, home to musicos Concentus, which brings experimental and well-known acts into space. The Firenze Yunon has a full schedule of concerts throughout the city, many of them for free. Classics plan and sell tickets for opera, corral, and orchestral events in theaters and churches throughout Florence. In addition, most churches offer periodic surgical music concerts, and these performances are often free. Notifications for this are often written on church doors or on bulletin boards right inside. Every Thursday, Florence, an English-language website, publishes weekly predictions of interesting events, including concerts around the city. Their list includes concerts and DJ appearances at bars and clubs. Most of us don't travel with suits or cocktail dresses in our carriages, but fortunately, casual smart clothing is usually enough for a culture night in Florence. For symphony orchestras, operas, and higher-end theatrical performances, shape on slacks and a collared shirt, preferably long sleeves for men, and for women, slacks and fine blouses or skirts or costumes. Avoid jeans, shorts, t-shirts, and flip-flops. In smaller theaters, alternative/experimental performances or rock/pop concerts, casual costumes are fine. Sheet music begins with blank music staff paper consisting of graphs with five lines and four spaces, each representing a note. Songwriters who write songs in standard music notation use staff paper to create sheet music, which can then be passed on to musicians who interpret sheet music for a musical performance. Making your own sheet music today is easier than ever. With notation software like Finale, or a free web-based Noteflight service, anyone can turn their musical ideas into professional music sheets. Use Noteflight to get started (see resources). Noteflight is a free web-based music service that allows you to write, print, and even save your sheet music as music files for playback. Noteflight has a clean and easy-to-use interface that makes it possible for even a beginner to create a song on sheet music. Because Noteflight allows you to listen to what you've written, you can experiment with different notes until you create something that sounds good, even if you are unfamiliar with the music mix. Create a Noteflight account and log in to start creating your own sheet music. You can start writing your song immediately. At the top of the page, located in a toolbar, click New Score to create a blank sheet music document. Choose whether you want your sheet music private or shared. Noteflight presents you with an empty sheet of music in the C key with a 4/4 time signature. Click Edit title at the top of your sheet music and type in your song name, then click Edit Composer and type your name. Make any necessary changes to your key signature or time signature in the score menu with either changing the time signature or changing the key signature of the command. Add notes and relax to your sheet music by clicking on empty music staff. Note heads appear, and you can drag and click where you want the note to appear. You can also use floating pallets to select different note durations. As you enter your notes, Noteflight automatically modifies your sheet music to keep the right number of beats in each bar. To listen to what's written at any point, go to the Play menu and select the playback option you want. Print your sheet music when you finish composing your song. The result will be a professional score of composing your song. You can also use Noteflight to create an audio file from your mix. Noteflight allows you to assign real tool sounds to the right parts. Go to file and select Export to save your finished sheet music as an MP3 or wav file. It allows you to record examples to your band. In 1910, familiar songs Let Me Call You Sweetheart and Down by the Old Mill Stream each sold astounding sums of five to six million copies. Every professional musician of the day will have a stack of colorful sheet music hidden on the piano bench and tucked away in boxes. Amateur musicians support merchants selling sheet music for use in homespun entertainment as well, especially during the holidays. The faces of early 20th-century characters such as Al Jolson, Fanny Brace and Eddie Cantor graced many early sheet music issues. Later, stars of the 1940 Hyde, such as Bing Crosby and Dorothy Laumore, thrilled fans on colorful illustrated covers. Even sheet music from the Beatles, Beach Boys and other recent issues include pop culture icons, such as Michael Jackson, gathered today. More recognizable stars and songs often hold the most value with a few exceptions to pure rarity or fascinating cover illustration. There is very intense competition for this ephemera since there are plenty of song titles to get around, but there are some crossover collecting items when it comes to sheet music. For example, military-themed pieces often gather military interest, also known as military gathering. Broadway musical enthusiasts will also be looking for numerous titles from Rogers and Hummerstein or Irving Berlin. Collectors of sports memorabilia are looking for music with images featuring last year's baseball champions. For example, the climber's vault containing cameo images of the St. Louis Cardinals baseball team in 1911 could sell for more than \$2,000 on the right market. Other buyers attract multiple covers featuring colorful paintings of beautiful women. Framed and hung on a wall, this can be a lovely accent in the house or office most anyone can appreciate. Because of the sheer volume produced and distributed as noted above, even though they are made of paper and can be somewhat fragile as they age, only a few samples of sheet music are really rare. The most common examples today sell in the \$3-\$5 range in antique centers and sometimes even less through internet auctions. For example, it's not uncommon to find lots of 25 to 30 pieces of sheet music selling online for \$10 or less for a whole lot. The most common parts should bring in excellent conditions even that much. However, many parts of Scott Joplin's work have high prices, so it is wise to thoroughly research the parts you may have before offering them for sale or flinging them in your donation bin. For example, Joplin's chrysanthemum could be over And many other works sell their sheet music for \$500 or more. Music pieces falling into the Black Americana category are also very valuable when in very good condition to be excellent. A version of Gombie Banana's Hoggy Boogie Dance, dating back to 1901, sold for \$eBay.com\$1,400 in 2016. When signed by notable celebrities, common pieces of sheet music can also jump exponentially at the value of signature collectors running for those as well. And while they are often not found, examples of sheet music dating back to the early 1800s can also be valuable. These are usually simple sheets of handwritten music that are recorded on paper before mass printing emerges. They are void of illustration and very simple to follow, but again, it is wise to research what you do before disposing of one of these rare cases. Maybe you have a treasure, even though it doesn't look much.
